Program Notes

Content pulled from the *Teaching Music Through Performance* Series and the online-based Wind Repertory Project

Blue Lake Overture, published in 1971, is dedicated to the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp in Twin Lakes, Michigan. As a concert overture, this piece is intended to be performed independently. Throughout the work, thematic material is continually developed. In this way, it is reminiscent of the music of romantic composers like Richard Strauss.

Next, *Vesuvius* began when composer Frank
Ticheli "started with the main theme... It suggested the image of a bacchanal in ancient Rome." It is meant to evoke the wild, uninhibited dances and celebrations during the last days of Pompei, prior to the eruption of Mount Vesuvius. It's turbulent and romantic composition style is almost emblematic of Mount Vesuvius itself.

Program Notes Continued...

Dimitri Shostakovich's *The Fire of Eternal*Glory stemmed from his visit to Heroes Square in

Novorossiisk. It symbolizes the memorial of those who lost their lives defending the city in The Great Patriotic

War. The real flame on which the piece is based serves as a symbol of eternal life, immortalizing those who passed.

Composer Jun Nagao arranged Holst's *Planets* suite for saxophone quartet, including new movements for Pluto and *Earth*. Fragments of themes from Holst's original composition come together to create this work. It was composed in hopes that Earth would one day become a peaceful planet.

To conclude, Sousa's *Hands Across the Sea* brings together the program. Composed as an address to America's allies throughout the world, the piece follows up on Nagao's hope of peace *Earth*.

Program Notes Continued...

After a Gentle Rain, a two-movement work, begins with "old memories in a quiet, meditative context," followed by "joy and freshness that seems to fill the air after a gentle rain." Based in Impressionism, the piece can feel like a departure from music with which many audiences are familiar, without being considered avant-garde.

According to composer Christopher Tucker, "Twilight in the Wilderness is a musical impression landscape painter Frederic Edwin Church's oil painting, 'Twilight in the Wilderness." The two main sections describe the 'macro' and 'micro' point of view of the painting, interpreting both the intricate details and the overall impact of the visual work. Coming together in the piece's conclusion, both points are seen simultaneously, giving the audience the full impact of the artwork through musical means.
